
July 2022 was not our first visit to Prices Bakery. We also went there 14 years ago in 2008. The photos below are of some of the cars that attended back then.

Part 2 of Jim Dawson's interview with Ian Webber, recorded 14 April 2022

Interviewer (Int) Jim Dawson Ian Webber (I W)


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**Int** That's a wonderful accolade for the man. (*David Brown - Ed*)

So what can you tell us a about the introduction of the Valiant here. Was there a great deal of engineering that had to be done here in Australia to make them workable on our roads rather than, you know, the interstates of the US?

I W Well there was because for a start Chrysler wasn't really interested in right hand drive. In fact, the whole design of the Valiant was biased to make it better in left hand drive because it gave more room on the driver's side of the tunnel. So when the car was turned over to right hand drive, there were a number of problems, some of which the Americans considered insurmountable and it was only Roy Rainsford who came up with the solutions that made it very workable in right hand drive.

Those early Valiants had a remote oil filter that was connected to the engine by flexible hose. That was to get the oil filter out of the way of the steering gear. So there was a lot of debate about whether the right hand drive was even a viable proposition, but ultimately they



were convinced, and this is where David Brown, because of his engineering background and, I suspect, a considerable credibility within Chrysler in the US was able to convince them to design this right hand drive version.

**Int** So most of that engineering was done in the US. Rather than here?

I W Absolutely, yes. Except I

think the design of the oil filter, the relocation of the oil filter was local work.

**Int** And I think the US versions had 13 inch wheels and very wisely 14 inch wheels were applied to the cars here. Given our roads, yes?

IW Yes, yes.

**Int** So then, to Chrysler in England 1964.

I W Yes, so let's say I went over there to marry my dearly beloved wife, Christine, and at that time, as I think I said, I was working in trucks in Chrysler Australia, so I went to work for the Dodge Brothers in Britain, Kew in London, and I was there for about 18 months.

And then Roy Rainsford offered me the job of chief truck engineer back here. So I came back to Australia and continued working on trucks, probably for the next three or four years.

**Int** It was a period of great expansion for Chrysler Australia.

Tonsley Park opened in 1964 for manufacturing, the merger/acquisition of the Rootes Group and inheriting their Melbourne production facilities, and then Lonsdale in 1966. What was the engineering department like in those days?

I W Well. I think I must have gone, I can't remember exactly, I think I went straight from truck engineering to the plant engineering division and I was thrown into this because I was an engineer and we designed the, I was working for a marvellous man called Marco Burse, who was an expert on conveyor systems and sets like and I was helping him to design the final line at Tonsley Park.

Int Right, and I understand that all the plant engineering for Lonsdale was done in-house so it must have been quite a lot of juggling going on in those times.

I W Yes, well, because a lot of it you'd, you would, it was as much dealing with suppliers of this equipment. I mean, you had to specify what you wanted, but the actual detailed design tended to be done by the mechanical handling people.

But it was. It was an exciting time and I can remember spending 30 hours nonstop working up to the launch of the final line when it finally went into production and so it was very exciting.

**Int** So that's the AP5?

**I W** It was the AP5, that's right.

**Int** And that was a very successful car for the company I believe?

I W Yes, well, it was the start of the Valiant era really because the S Series and the R Series were only in, you know, relatively small numbers and of course with the so-called local content plan, as the volume went up, so did the local content have to go up.

I can remember, I know it was an AP5 because we were building these conveyor systems that were

up in the air called power and free conveyors where we were trying to work out how to use this in the final line at Tonsley Park. Anyway, one of the devices didn't work correctly, so an AP5 body came off the end of the conveyor and crashed 30 feet to the ground. So I do remember that!

Int He said, well, yes!

**I W** And that was definitely an AP5 body, so...

Int How much lead time went into a change in model for example? We've got the AP5, AP6, VC and the VE and then obviously they were starting to think about the change from the slant 6 to the D engine.

I W Well, we were locked in, pretty much we were locked into the American uhm, model changes largely. I mean you could. You could fudge it for a few months, but you couldn't, you really couldn't stay with the old model for much after the end of their model year.

So for those first few years, that's why there was an AP6. AP5 and AP6. We're still using a lot of American content. AP7 was the VC, still a lot of American content. It really wasn't until we got to VG that you got the 95% Australian content because that's when we brought in the D engine.

**Int** The development of that engine largely took place here in Australia?

I understand it was a truck engine they discarded in the US.

I W Well I don't say they discarded it but they didn't use it right, because it had quite a few innovative features, such as an alleged hemi head. Although it really, I think it had to be fairly good imagination to see it as a hemi, but umm, cast crankshaft, which was unusual for its era and so yes it was a very modern engine.

Int And it proved to be very successful for the company, but the development of it largely took place here?

I W Yes, it did. It had only reached a certain point in the States and we had to pick it up from there,

Int After the VG we, well controversy reigns over the going to the VH, which was seen to be being very large when Holden were downsizing to the Commodore and what have you so, you were around the place when the planning for that range of vehicles came out?

I W I was and yes, you know with the wisdom of hindsight I can remember Roy Rainsford saying he wished that they had continued on with the VG for another couple more years because there were things we could have done rather than rushing into the VH, which was a massive programme and it really was out of step, I think you'd have to say, with changing taste at the time.

**Int** What do you recall of the development of the Charger?

I W Well, the Charger, the original, the original product plan for the VH Series was a sedan, a long wheelbase sedan, a two door hardtop, the station wagon and probably the ute. I can't remember, but the point was that the two door hardtop was a fad in America at the time, so everybody said you've got to have one in your product line up. Well, it became pretty clear that it wasn't really the way to go and it was David Brown, God bless his cotton socks, who got the bright idea of taking the (because there

was a lot of tooling involved in the two door hardtop), the special long door and the door hardware, the changed angle of the windscreen, and so on, he got the bright idea of building this specialty coupe off using as much as possible of the already expended money that had gone into the two door hardtop.

So he did all this quite secretly and he didn't tell anybody in Detroit till the programme was virtually completed and he needed some money to finish it off, by which time it was largely a fait accompli.

Int And the Americans?

I W Uh, I don't think it impressed the yanks too much, but it got us this the Charger and....

Int "Car of the Year" and certainly one of the most successful...

**I W** Yes, individual of the vehicles that we built, yes.

Int So 1971, you pick up sticks and take up the role of Chief Engineer with Chrysler in South Africa.

What was Vorster's South Africa like in 1971?

I W Well, it was, it was a funny country. I mean the only reason I went to South Africa is because David Brown had been appointed the Vice President International, that covered both Australia and South Africa. Logically, that meant that they were going to take the VH

Valiant from Australia rather than the models from the States, right. Something that didn't fill them with a great deal of enthusiasm I have to tell you but, anyway, that was the game and so yes, I went over there, sort of to launch the VH Valiant in South Africa

We lived, it's been a source of great surprise to me that we, we felt as safe as we did because we lived on the very edge of Pretoria and, uh, right next to us was an abandoned farmhouse that was used at the weekends by the black community living in the area to have a big booze up next door.

But we never, ever felt any sense of fear. I look back on it and I wonder why not? I mean, maybe 'cause you were just too ignorant of the realities.

We never really had anything to do with the Bantu as they were called. They were a community that lived in their own communities away from white communities. And so, you know, there was a true separation, and if you were young and thoughtless, as I think we were, we just accepted it for what it was and got on with it.

**Int** And so the VH Valiant range was entirely produced, stamped and everything in South Africa or it was coming from Australia or?

I W Coming from Australia. Int OK, so CKD kits again?

I W Although the CKD programme in South Africa worked in a different way. There it was based on weight, not value, so they built the engine. They were building engines in South Africa long before we were

Int And they were using Slant Six engines for that, so they never took the D engine?

I W A Slant Six engine.

**Int** And they were building that whole engine in South Africa?

I W Yes, right, and rear axle assemblies because they had hypoid milling machines, and because the heaviest parts of the car were the ones that they got the greatest benefit from their content programme, sure.

Int You're there in South Africa and then you take up the role of Deputy Managing Director and that was about 1974?

I W Early 74.

Int Excuse my ignorance, but is that sort of the start of a transition from engineering to businessman?

I W Yes, I think that's right. I think engineering gives you a good start in from the business point of view. But that was yes, I became, but not that long afterwards I was asked either to be the Chief Engineer of Chrysler UK. or the Managing Director of Chrysler Australia so I came back here, late 1974.

Int And what would be the highlight, your best memory, of your time in South Africa?

I W It is a lovely country. It's about the size of New South Wales. It's full of the most beautiful scenery and of course socially, it's an extremely interesting country. With all of these crosscurrents of racial conflict, but also, you know it's a very interesting colourful country and it's a beautiful country physically. So yes, we really enjoyed our time in South Africa, but of course you go to places like the Kruger National Park, animals, you know, our children thought this was marvellous.
