"It is a very great honour to be asked to speak, on behalf of the Chrysler Restorers Club of Australia, at the funeral of our esteemed past president Graham.



Lindsay Gibb

Guest Lindsay Gibb (L G)

Int It's July the 7th, 2022 and on behalf of the Chrysler Restorers Clubs of Australia, South Australian Division, I'd like to welcome all listeners and readers to our second edition of Living Histories. It's my very great pleasure to be in conversation today with Mr Lindsay Gibb, a senior statesman and life member of our club who was one of the very first to make my wife and I welcome to this club.

Lindsay has had a long career associated with Chrysler Australia, and with cars generally, but best we hear all of that from Lindsay.

Welcome.


L G Thank you.

Int Thanks for travelling down here to see me today.


L G That was my pleasure. I've enjoyed the drive.

Int Excellent. Born and raised a country boy?

L G Yes, I was born at a little country town called Orroroo, in the upper- north of South Australia, and I lived on a farm with my mum and dad in a little place called Johnburgh.



I don't think it's even shown on the map anymore, [Google is all powerful. The region is outlined



but Johnburgh township is under the "b" - Ed] but it was a very dry, desolate country village. I suppose for the want of a better word, I went to school there as a primary school only.

When I started school, there were about 15 students, one teacher of course and by the time I left, I had to do grade 8 by correspondence just to keep the school open, there were so few numbers.

And when I left, the school closed and that was basically the end of Johnburgh.

Int You finished it off! Big family?

L G Big family, five brothers, five in total, with four brothers and myself.

Int So what was the family business in those days?

L G Well, they were mum and dad, they just had a small farm. Not enough to really bring up five kids through drought times, wartimes, so dad used to go out building concrete tanks with his brothers. I think there was two of them, and they would go around to the stations and building concrete tanks for the graziers, and that's helped their income, plus he used to do a bit of work on the Carrieton Council in which district we lived, and so that got us a very welcome income, but as each of us left school, we left home and, strangely enough, we all went to Orroroo.

My oldest brother Murray, he was hell bent on building a garage and starting off in the motor trade. He had worked with his uncle, who was the Waymouth dealer and Waymouth, of course, in those days was the Chrysler agent I suppose. And then Waymouth had their dealerships throughout the country regions as well as here in Adelaide.

So he left home in the early days and started to build this garage and when I left school all I wanted to do was get out of Johnburgh because I was sick of the dust storms and no company, just nothing. It was depressing to live there, so I jumped on my push-bike and I rode out of town and headed for the big sticks of Orroroo.

Int "Rode out of town" - love it! So what is your earliest memory of motor cars and did that, light a passion in you then or did that came later?

L G Well, Dad had a T model Ford. That was the first car that I remember and that was a buckboard and us kids used to sit in the back of the buckboard and then he got a Buick, 6 cylinder Buick. and that was a luxury car in those days? 1925, I think it was.

Int For Buick was just one down from the Cadillac, wasn't it?

L G Yes it was, it was the upper class of the General Motors range.

Int Long way above a Chev.

L G Oh, absolutely, absolutely. And so, he had that and I was mad keen on it of course.

But when I moved to Orroroo, I think I would have been 15, probably 15 years old when I moved there, and of course I wanted to get into the motor trade. That was my aim, to get into the motor business.

We got started to build this garage and dad came and helped us and we built this garage and it turned out to look a bit like a church that had gone wrong, because the fellow who designed the roof, had too big a pitch on it, and it had a very high roof, still standing today in Orroroo as you drive into town on the right hand side.

And so we started to build the garage and to my surprise, one night Murray came home in a brand new Austin. I think it was an Austin A70 from memory, about 1950 this would have been, and he had just acquired the Austin franchise from the All-British Motor House here in 75 Pirie St. and he came home and this Austin and wow, I thought this was this was the bees knees, so we became Austin dealers, which later become BMC.

Well, I was very interested. We had a pit and by then we'd built the garage and we got a hoist and so I became a grease monkey in the Austin franchise.

But I was always keen on selling and so I started to sell these little Austins, the A30s and 40s and 60s and so on, and then my uncle, who had the Waymouth dealership across the road retired, and with a fairly new garage directly opposite us, across the road. So the next thing I knew was Waymouth knocking on the door. My uncle had retired, and the business was just shut up, so we had a visit from Waymouth asking if we wanted to buy the garage?

I think we bought it for about 2,000 pounds. Walk in, walk out.

Int Do you remember what year that was?

L G That would have been Chrysler Royal era.

Int So mid late 50's?

L G Through it towards the end of the Royal yes, it would have been late 50's.

So then we became Waymouth dealers and I sold, I think, a couple of Chrysler Royals and a Chrysler Royal utility and that was about it. And at that stage they, I think they had the Simca, Simca Vedette and Simca Aronde.

Int I was going to ask you about the Simca.

L G Yes, and that's another story that will come shortly.

So the next thing we knew we had an approach from Chrysler. I can't remember the man that came around, probably one of the reps and said we're going to go direct distribution, Waymouth is out, and we'd like you to become a Chrysler dealer.

Int So that would have been the late 50s I guess?

L G Very late 50s early 60s, because not very long after that we were invited to attend the release of the R Series Valiant.

Int Right, we'll get to that in a second. I've got a few more questions I want to ask you about what came before that.

So the first car you ever sold through the dealership was a Royal, was it?

L G Yes, it was.

Int And alongside the Royals, were you involved in selling the bigger stuff, the Fireflite and what

have you that were around at that time or were they just not in the picture out there?

L G They were too rich for the country folk. Although there was a few Chevs that were being sold by the Holden dealer; we had a pretty aggressive Holden dealership in town, and also a Ford dealership.

Int So there was competition around?

L G Yes, but the Ford Fairlane, the early Fords and the Chrysler Royal and the Chev was I suppose competition in those days. But the Royal was getting pretty tired and just about run its race.

Int Ian Webber tells me that at around that time Chrysler Australia was virtually on its knees and that David Brown had been sent to this country with a brief to either get in or get out.

L G That's fair, yes, that's exactly right.

Int So now you've sold a couple of Royals and a Royal ute and you're marketing the Simca range How well was the Simca accepted in the country regions.

L G I really wasn't interested in Simca because we still had the BMC franchise and we'd spent many, many years promoting Austin and then later Morris, or BMC, and so I wasn't really very interested in Simca which turned out to my detriment, we paid dearly for it later, because with the R & S Series, you couldn't get an S Series unless you took a Simca.

Int Well this will get interesting!



Lindsay Gibb (ctd)

L G Oh yeah, it was a bit of blackmail. [Subsequently made illegal by the Trade Practices Act of 1974 - Ed]

Int This will get interesting. I get the feeling through observation, I guess, driving around in the countryside and talking with people, that the Chrysler as a brand had a pretty good reputation out in the country.

L G Ahh yes, it had.

Int So what do you put that down to, Lindsay?

L G Well, I think they were advanced right from day one of Chrysler coming to Australia. They had four wheel brakes, they had the best engines and they were top of the class as far as engineering was concerned. Way back in the late 20s, 30's, 40s, etc. They were very good car.

The Dodge. I can remember a few of the 1940's Dodges around and they were head and shoulders above anything else. They had a very good reputation.

Int Chrysler was of course known as "The Engineering Company" throughout that period of time.

L G Oh yes, yes, yes. They were advanced right through that era really, that motoring era.

Int Competition not only in town from the Holden and the Ford dealers, but competition from within your own ranks the BMC versus the Simca!

Well, it's an excellent insight, Lindsay. And the bigger US Chrysler cars were a bit rich for your market. So I guess we get to the introduction of the R Series Valiant. Tell us how soon before the

actual launch did you become aware that this vehicle was coming?

L G I had no idea! We got invited to the release of a new model, probably there was a leak around the Adelaide area, but once we got into the far country, we knew nothing about the R series coming.

Int So give me your first impressions when you saw this thing.

L G Well, I was invited to the release of the R Series and everybody was excited. All the dealers were there for the release and David Brown was there talking about it, etc etc. but to my dismay, they said there's not going to be many of these because as we speak there's a new model heading our way and there's only going to be about 1000 of them made and so you're not going to get many of these.

I thought, this is absolutely ridiculous. Like, why are we getting this car when there's a new model already on the way?

How are we going to look the customers in the eye that we sell them an R Series and then there's a new model hot on its tail? Anyway, we were allocated one! I sold that within a few weeks.

Int Do you remember who you sold it to?

L G Yes I do, he was actually the Rep for one of the tractor companies, I can't remember which one, but he lived in Clare, and so I sold it and it went out of the district and I never saw it again.

Painting Brenton's Cars

I first met Brenton Hamilton in about 1991. He phoned me asking to quote to paint his 1940 D 15 Dodge sedan. After he accepted the quote I set about painting it. I stripped it back to bare metal, fixed the rust and dents, acid washed, primed then top coated it using Dulon Triple A paint. Brenton had this car for some time. The car is now owned by Graham McRae. [Written before Graham's death - Ed]

Sometime later he purchased a 1956 Dodge Kingsway Coronet which needed a bit of tidying and he wanted it two toned. Brenton wanted to save money so he decided to do some of the preparation (donkey work) himself. Although it wasn't a back to bare metal job the car looked quite smart.

Somewhere along the way a 1971 VH Charger appeared and again a paint job was required. Brenton loved this car. He always had the ability to find an extra bit of jewellery or tail light lenses that were better than the ones that came with his cars and he continued to upgrade them to his standard. Unfortunately this car was hit from behind and he had to find a back end to repair it.

Brenton had found a panel van for my son to buy. Brett was 14 at the time. The problem was it was in Broken Hill so I had to hire a car trailer and drive to Broken Hill. What I didn't know was that he had found a wrecker there who had a wrecked Charger. Bruce Lord had organized the wrecker to cut up the rear end so it would fit into the panel van. After we had loaded the panel van onto the trailer Brenton said that he need to pick up a spare part from the



wreckers. The Charger rear end fitted nicely into the back of the panel van and travelled comfortably back to Adelaide. Charger repaired. Very sneaky!

This well loved Charger was stolen in the city and after they had their joy ride the mongrels set the car alight. Brenton was very upset about his beloved Charger being burnt out.

I got another visit from Brenton, this time he had bought a 1956 Canadian Dodge Mayflower which had been an American Diplomatic car from Canberra and he wanted it painted for the Canberra Rally. Again he did a lot of the preparation work,

under supervision. This time we triple toned it and it looked nice. Brenton continued adding his extra parts and pieces to enhance it. He took a photo of it in front of Parliament House.

Bad luck struck again when this car caught on fire and burnt out on the way home from Broken Hill.

He also had an AP6 for a while and I also painted a motor bike and side car for him. I always enjoyed Brenton's company. He worked with me on several jobs and projects after he retired. He really was/is a Chrysler man.
