


Greg Newley conducted the raffle.

Neill Wormald

Interviewer: Jim Dawson (INT) Interviewee: Neill Wormald

Date: 28 May 2025

INT: Welcome Chrysler restorers everywhere to this part of our series of living histories, and it's my great pleasure today to be in conversation with Neill Wormald, a long term member of the Chrysler Restorers Club of Australia, SA Division. Welcome Neill and thank you for hosting me today.

NW: Thank you.

INT: We better get down to the start first. Where were you born?

N W: I was born at a hospital north of Adelaide, I'm not sure what it was called. Northern Community or something like that.

INT: Right out on the Main North Road.

N W: We lived at Pooraka. My parents lived on acreage then when I was quite young, they built another house on the Main North Road and I spent my childhood there.

INT: And what did mum and dad do?

N W: My father was a shunter in the South Australian Railways. He worked there for 43 years or thereabouts. My mother stayed home, but didn't have an easy life. She not only did ironing and cleaning but lots of other things around the property because we lived off the land. We had a decent sized block. We had lots of fruit trees, so each year she preserved 300 jars of fruit and about 300 jars of jam and the old man used to grow trombones. We would have a couple of hundred of them and we'd swap with the market gardens all around us. A slaughterman who worked next door at the abattoir was allowed to bring home as much offal as he liked, and would bring mum a lot of lambs fry and tripe and brains and all this sort of thing for us to eat. We actually ate pretty well because of the market gardens around us.

INT: That's a slightly unusual upbringing, but not completely atypical of the times.

N W: Well, we probably were a bit behind the times. We only had a bucket toilet, which we had to empty ourselves. We used to boil a copper outside and bring water in and put in a round tin tub. Mostly we bathed once a week, whether we needed it or not! Every night mum would boil the jug and then she'd sort of duck bathe us before we went to bed; wipe us all over. And we never lived flash, that's for sure.

INT: And where did you go to school?

N W: I went to Pooraka Primary School.

INT: What's the first car you remembered your dad having?

N W: My parents never had a car.

INT: There you go!

N W: He rode a bike everywhere. He would put two or three of us kids on the bike - I had three brothers. Grandma also lived with us. And one of my cousins from Balaclava used to spend a lot of time with us as well. It was a full household.

INT: So what was the 1st motor car you can remember catching your eye.


N W: I think one of my uncles had a Chev, probably 1950s, had these big wings going out the side. I don't know if you know the one. I remember I was pretty happy when I could have a ride in that.

INT: Chev Impala or something like that?

N W: Yes, it was probably the first car to catch my eye.

INT: So your interest in cars solidified after that? Or is that something that came along later for you?

N W: Well. I was pretty into motorbikes and I had had a motor scooter - because you could take girls out on a motor scooter. If you ride up on a motorbike her old man would boot you out. But my brother



and I had three or four motorbikes between us and I had a couple of motor scooters.

INT: So there's the English motorbikes?

N W: The motorbikes were a BSA Bantam and we had a 500 Triumph and a little 125 Honda. Hmm. And I had a 200cc motor scooter, a bit bigger than most scooters. [Ed: All the better for carrying those girls.] I mainly rode the scooters to work. My first car was a 1934 Hillman Minx, for which I paid £20.

INT: Probably a fair bit of money in those days. So just going backwards a little bit here, at what age did you go to work?

N W: I left school at 14 and went to work on my uncle's farm at Pooraka. At that time we lived on the farm because dad owned half the land, although later he sold it to his brother. At 14 I wasn't driving, I could only ride a bike. I worked there for five years.

INT: At what age did you get your driver's licence?

N W: I think I was probably 16 or 17. I would drive the old Commer truck. They also had a little Ford Prefect, which they let me drive a couple of times. I remember an occasion when my uncle had a frozen shoulder. We loaded up a few hundred chooks because we

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had 25,000 fowls in a hatchery, the whole lot free range. And then when the truck was loaded up, my uncle couldn't drive. So he said look you're going to have to take the truck to the market.

INT: Well.

N W: I was a bit nervous that day! I was going up the OLD Morphett Street Bridge – which was very steep - NOT like it is now. A guy with a horse and cart decided to stop and give his horse a drink at the top because it had pulled the cart up the hill. I had to stop the Commer Truck and hold it with the handbrake. I was just about messing my pants, I can tell you. And I had to start uphill, but managed without hitting any cars.

INT: Good job! When you left the chooks and the fowls, where did you head then?

N W: Well once caged chickens came in, the farm didn't do that well. The caged chickens really put all the old fashioned farms out of business.

INT: Scale of economies and all.

N W: Yes. W used to feed them hot mash in the morning and it took a lot of work. My dad got me a job in the railways. Initially I worked lifting carriages off the bogeys (wheels) at the Islington works. I worked there, but never liked it, locked in and never had enough to do. And when the boss came out, you had to make out that you were busy. I don't know how you'd do that. But anyway, I worked there for quite a few years. And then a job come up in their tarpaulin shop. I went for the interview and Mr Bird, who interviewed me, said to me "This is a job you can do outside". And I said "Oh is it!?!" And he wasn't too sure if he wanted to give me the job. But then he said that since my father worked for the railways and had been there 43 years or so that he would give me the job.

INT: It's not what you know, it's who you know.

N W: And I really never looked back. I took to that like a duck took to water. I picked everything up and I was willing to learn. I reckon you can learn from everybody. Even the bludgers can teach you something, because they know the quickest way to do everything.

INT: That's the old story. If you want something done, give it to the lazy bloke who will find the easy way.

N W: Yeah, that's right. I started doing a lot of part time work for some of the other companies around town, because Vietnam War was on and there was lots and lots of work. I ended up leaving the railways and starting my own business. And I never looked back.

INT: So by now you were married.

N W: Yes. I got married at 21. I'd already bought a block of land at Banksia Park. I had a house built up there. My first child was born by the time my house was finished. So we moved in there. By that time, I had sold the Hillman and I had a side valve Morris Minor.

INT: Side valve!

N W: You had to change gears even to go to Tea Tree Gully; it would run out of steam. My second child was born there. And then my


marriage went south when the kids were quite little. And I was left with the 2 boys.. I was working from home in the shed, which I was able to do. They didn't have unmarried fathers pensions in those days, it was only for the women.

INT: No, sir!

N W: So I worked from home in the shed and I went around to a lot of the canvas factories and they gave me piece work. They'd bring loads of stuff and I'd sew it all up and that's how I made my living for a few years to put the kids through school. Slowly the business got bigger and I bought a house at Ridgehaven, and built a larger factory in the back. I employed two or three people there and started doing more work. Then the boys went to Mount Gambier to live with their mother for a while, when they got up in their teens.

INT: How did you feel about that? Having bought them up from small?

N W: It knocks you about a bit, but I didn't stop them because she might have talked them him into it. I thought, well, that'll be good for them. They knew they could come back. They both came back eventually. I'd been going with Joan by that time. I was on my own for eight or nine years before I met



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Joan. And then I sold my house and came to live with Joan and we bought a factory together.

INT: What were you driving by this stage.

NW: A Valiant.

INT: Tell me about the first Valiant you owned.

N W: I'm not really sure of the models. The first one was slant 6.

INT: The leaning Tower of Power.

N W: Yeah, it really was.

INT: The only motor worth

knowing about.

N W: It was unstoppable. I used to often drive my two boys over to see their grandparents. They lived in Coleraine, Vic. Often I was busy and I had to get back. A few times I drove over and back in one day – 900km return. I used to push that Valiant value. Really used to push it to high speeds and it just kept on going. It never hurt it. I might have to get back for work, because I used to work very hard around school holidays and before Christmas. That's where I made my cream because I used to mainly do repairs and camping things those days. Once I got the factory I did a lot of work for defence department contracts. I was the person who designed the modern swags that you see today. When I was young a swag was really just a piece of

canvas that went over here with a couple of studs on it. The swags they've got today I designed. For many, many years, I used to sell 15,000 a year.

INT: That's getting into serious production.

N W: But of course, China makes them all now.

INT: Probably not as well as Wormald Canvas did ...

N W: No, but, and they're all my design, that they haven't really changed much.

INT: At the peak of your production, how many employees did you have?

N W: Pretty close to 40 at one stage.

INT: That's getting way beyond a cottage industry - that's starting to be a serious player.

N W: Yes. I also made . Camper vans that went on 6 by 4 trailers before they were popular. When I was quite young I made my first camper van with beds that would pull out. Then I started making camper vans and selling them throughout Australia. I used to make several hundred a year and with them had come several hundred awnings and a lot of them would have annexes. I made them for different height trailers and all that sort of thing. So that was quite

big. I had that and the swags all going at the same time.

INT: Plus you've got defence contracts and people walking off the street wanting a tonneau cover for a Valiant Ute.

N W: Yeah, I would do that as well; and canopies.

INT: Yeah.

N W: I bought a factory across the road from my house in Ridgehaven. I sold that house when I moved in with Joan. Later I leased an additional factory than bought a factory next door to that. I was going to buy a 3rd property and I thought "What am I doing?" That's when I went down to Golden Grove and we bought 2 big blocks and built a brand new factory down there, which is the one that I still own and is being leased to the people who bought the business from me two years ago.

INT: I sent a second cousin there not two months ago and he had a roof and side curtains for a WW 2 Jeep done there. Very happy too, by the way. So they're keeping up with good standards.

N W: Good. Well, I hope they do.

INT: So how long have you been with Joan now?

N W: 46 years.

INT: That's almost a career there.

N W: When we got together, Joan (who already had 2 children and her own house) not only looked after all matters at home (including mowing lawns, painting etc) but worked in the business. This enabled me to put in more effort at work, without which we would not have been able to forge ahead as we did.

INT: After that first experience with the Valiant, the die was cast? You were a Chrysler man, from then on?

N W: The next one I bought, you'll probably find a photo of it, and know the model. It was when they started making the Hemi.

INT: So that would be 1970 or thereabouts.



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N W: At that time my factory was just down from Rick's Frith's wrecking yard. And of course he had an old Chrysler that I always had my eye on. So I went down to see him and asked if he would you sell it to me? He said he would on condition that I definitely restore it and become a member of the Chrysler Restorers Club - which is probably the best thing I've ever done.

INT: Do you remember when you joined the club.

N W: I'm not sure. I was gonna join then and then Rick said to wait until after Christmas. [Ed: In those days our membership year ran from January to December]

N W: The first National Rally that I got a little bit involved with was in the Barossa. Richard would probably know when that was.

INT: I'm sure Richard will pull the date. [Ed: 1992]

N W: And I can show you a photo of that rally and you'll understand the club I joined.

INT: Yes.

N W: It is not like the club today.

INT: No. So tell me what you told me on the phone when we first

touched base about this.

N W: Well, I've got some photos there that I can grab. That's my son's racing car.

INT: OK, so that's a VF or a VG. One of the other? O'Connor Airlines. There's another blast from the past in Mount Gambier.

N W: You used to park it as that might have been in the petrol station then. Yeah, because they sponsored him.

INT: Ampol City - I can't think of the characters who had that now, but I do remember it. There you go. We'll take that and let Richard have a copy of that.

N W: Now. That's the club I ioined.

INT: Lots of wooden wheels. A great many wooden wheels.

N W: Joan and I went up to the Barossa Rally for the day. Ross Bryant spent hours with us up there on the display day and took us around. I don't think he was president at that time. He might have been, I don't know. [Ed: He was] But you know, it was this sort of thing - a much different club.

INT: So lots of 1925 or virtually all 1920s stuff. I remember you

saying to me, if someone turned up with something from the late 30s, you thought they were very modern.

N W: That's right. You can see why by looking at these photos. If we were doing a trip, going places, if you broke down, you'd have 6 heads under the bonnet, you'd have parts coming out of everyone else's cars and you'd be on the road. In no time.

INT: Just wonderful, isn't it?

N W: Especially if Dick [Hart] was there.

INT: Dick's been proving a bit elusive to getting his story done.

N W: Good luck with that.

INT: So what was the car that you bought from Rick Frith's wrecking yard?

N W: It was a 1926 Chrysler. When I brought this car home, some of the family wanted to know whether I had "lost it".

INT: Looking at a photo, I can understand the feeling. Lots of ageing wood and 3 buckets of rust.

He stressed that a concourse standard job wasn't needed but just a job to make it look presentable. He said that Helena wanted some paint and panel work done on her Dodge ute. My first thought was that Lindsay Gibbs may like the job, but after a bit more thought, I decided that perhaps he wouldn't be interested - something about his age niggled at me.

After some more Q and A with Helena she said that she felt embarrassed about driving it around Mannum and would like it to look reasonably tidy. She was also finding it difficult to find a painter who wasn't aiming to break the bank or clear the national debt.

TJ Richards Trouble

Summary of the Inquest into the death of Mrs Ann Lister Oldfield

Mrs Oldfield was a passenger on a tram which was travelling from the City to Hilton on the 13th of November 1937.

Just after midday on Fisher Terrace Mile End (now South Road) a long piece of metal tubing came through the floor of the tram and went through Mrs Oldfield's left leg before becoming embedded in the tram wall.

The tram made an emergency stop and the Driver and Conductor attended Mrs Oldfield.

No tools were available to assist her so a decision was made to continue on to Doctor Hurst's surgery on Rowland Road (now Sir Donald Bradman Drive).

Dr Hurst attended promptly and after a morphine injection the tubing was sawn off sufficiently to allow Mrs Oldfield to be carried to the Doctor's Surgery.

She was then transported to Hospital to remove the tubing from her leg, but despite several Hospital stays over the next 2 months she eventually died in the Memorial Hospital from blood poisoning on the 16th of January 1938.

The remaining metal tubing about 9

feet long was removed from under the tram to investigate the source.

The MTT did not stock or use the metal tubing which was described as being D shaped and around 7/8 of an inch Diameter.

The Manager of Modern Metal Products of Bowden confirmed that the tubing was identical to a delivery he had received from T J Richards & Sons Keswick just before midday on the 13th of November 1937. The delivery consisted of 660 x 10'6" lengths of tubing.

A driver employed by W & R Gibb



carriers of Port Adelaide had picked up the tubing from Richards, but instead of being bundled as expected it was supplied as loose lengths. The tubing was placed along the lorry tray and secured with a rope. The driver proceeded to Modern Metal Products via the Bay Road, South Road, Fisher Terrace, Taylors Road, and then across Port Road to Bowden.

Coroner's Conclusion: The metal tubing had accidently dropped off the lorry and into the tram track at Fisher Terrace Mile End, the driver was unaware and the occurrence was entirely accidental.

Mrs Oldfield is buried in the Myponga Cemetery.
